Day 1: TOKYO » YOKOHAMA » KAMAKURA

Departing from Tokyo Station, your journey begins in Yokohama with a visit to the enchanting Sankeien Garden. This traditional Japanese garden, dotted with historic architecture, offers a breathtaking retreat where cultural heritage and serene beauty blend seamlessly. Stroll through its peaceful paths and discover a hidden sanctuary that embodies Japan's timeless elegance. Next, travel to the ancient capital of Kamakura, where history and nature intertwine. Savor the local specialty, a fresh shirasu rice bowl, before exploring heritage sites that tell captivating stories of Japan's past. Surrounded by sea and mountains, Kamakura invites you to slow down, wander its charming streets, and immerse yourself in the harmony of culture and nature.

Day 2: KAMAKURA » ENOSHIMA » SHUZENJI » IZU HIGHLAND

Begin your day aboard the charming Enoshima Electric Railway, a retro train that winds through seaside towns and along the coast, offering nostalgic views of city streets and ocean horizons. Arriving at Enoshima, visit the iconic Enoshima Sea Candle, a lighthouse observatory with sweeping 360° panoramas of Mount Fuji and the Pacific Ocean. Stroll the island's paths to soak in its coastal charm. Continue to the heart of the Izu Peninsula – Shuzenji, where you'll visit the historic temple founded by Kobo Daishi. Walk the serene Bamboo Path, immersing yourself in centuries-old hot spring culture. In the afternoon, discover the joy of creation with hands-on workshops: traditional paper-making, straw craft, indigo dyeing, tofu-making, and crafting guardian Jizō charms – each rooted in local heritage. As evening

falls, retreat to a hot spring inn in Izu Kōgen, where open-air baths overlook Sagami Bay, offering the perfect blend of relaxation and scenic beauty.

Day 3: IZU HIGHLAND » ATAMI

Begin your day with an invigorating hike along the dramatic cliffs of Jogasaki Coast, formed by the eruption of Mount Omuro some 4,000 years ago. Walk across rugged lava plateaus shaped by the Pacific's crashing waves, and pause at the famous suspension bridge for breathtaking panoramas stretching all the way to the Izu Islands. In the afternoon, travel to Atami, where the Atami Plum Garden offers seasonal beauty in every bloom and leaf. As evening falls, immerse yourself in the soothing waters of Atami Onsen, a hot spring once cherished by Tokugawa Ieyasu, and reflect on centuries of history while indulging in pure relaxation.

Day 4: ATAMI » FUJINOMIYA » OSHINO VILLAGE » TOKYO

On your last day, immerse yourself in the spiritual heart of the Fuji foothills. Begin with a visit to Fujisan Hongu Sengen Taisha, the revered shrine of Mount Fuji worship, where you'll connect with Japan's deep spiritual traditions. Pause at the tranquil Wakutama Pond, a sacred spring tied to Fuji faith. Continue to the enchanting Shiraito Falls, where pure spring water from Mount Fuji cascades in delicate streams, creating a dreamlike landscape. Then explore the mystical ponds of Oshino Hakkai, fed by Fuji's snowmelt, each shimmering with clarity and legend. Savor a lunch of local cuisine at the mountain's base, before returning to Tokyo. As you gaze at Mount Fuji from your window, reflect on four unforgettable days filled with the blessings of history and nature.

Sankeien Garden

Sankeien Garden, a quintessential Japanese garden adorned with historic buildings and seasonal blooms.



Enoshima Electric Railway

Enoshima Electric Railway (Enoden) is a charming seaside train line connecting Kamakura and Fujisawa, known for its slow, scenic ride past beaches, temples, and local neighborhoods. Its retro cars and coastal views make it one of Japan's most beloved local railways.



Enoshima Sea Candle

Officially the Enoshima Lighthouse Observation Tower, this sleek, candle-shaped landmark rises above Enoshima Island. Built in 2003, it became widely known by its current nickname after a public vote in 2010.

Shuzenji

A charming hot spring resort town located in the center of the Izu Peninsula, Shizuoka. Known for its relaxing ambiance and scenic beauty, it offers a perfect blend of nature, history, and culture, highlighted by the historical Zen temple, Shuzenji Temple.



Jogasaki Coast

Jogasaki Coast, known for its rugged beauty and dramatic cliffs formed by volcanic activity. Walk along the Jogasaki Picnical Course and Nature Study Trail, crossing the thrilling Kadowaki Suspension Bridge and visiting the Kadowaki Lighthouse's observation deck for stunning coastal views.



Mt. Omuro

Mt. Omuro is a perfectly shaped, grass-covered volcanic cone offering panoramic views of the Izu Peninsula, Mt. Fuji, and the ocean. Visitors can ride a chairlift to the summit and enjoy an easy circular walk around the crater, making it one of the region's most scenic and accessible nature experiences.



Atami Onsen (Hot Springs)

Immerse yourself in Atami's historic hot springs, which have captivated bathers since the Nara period (710-794). The healing properties of these springs fascinated Shogun Tokugawa Ieyasu, who even attempted to recreate them in Edo (now Tokyo). Today, a diverse array of hot springs continues to attract visitors seeking rejuvenation and relaxation in these therapeutic waters.



Fujisan Hongu Sengen Taisha

Fujisan Hongu Sengen Taisha Shrine, in Fujinomiya, Shizuoka, is the head shrine of over 1,300 Sengen and Asama shrines. Built over 1,000 years ago to appease Mount Fuji's eruptions, it serves as a spiritual site for climbers to pray and purify themselves before ascending the mountain. The shrine showcases unique architecture and beautiful cherry blossoms in spring.

Wakutama Pond

Wakutamaike Pond is a spring within the grounds of Fujisan Hongu Sengen Taisha Shrine. Designated a Special Natural Monument, it is also celebrated as one of the finest waters of the Heisei era.



Shiraito Falls

A nationally designated scenic spot and natural monument, where Mt. Fuji's spring water flows in hundreds of thin streams over a wide curved cliff, creating a graceful, silk-like appearance and a beautifully atmospheric setting.



Oshino Hakkai

Also known as the Eight Ponds of Oshino, this enchanting area is part of the "Fujisan, sacred place and source of artistic inspiration" UNESCO World Heritage Site. Nestled in the foothills of Mount Fuji in Yamanashi, these ponds are renowned for their crystal-clear spring water, which flows from the snowmelt of Mount Fuji itself.
